13th Annual Washington State International Kite Festival

LONG BEACH, WASHINGTON — Get those kite projects, banners, flags, line art, you've been working on all year and bring them to the beach! From August 15-21, the 13th Annual Washington State International Kite Festival is

the place to show 'em off, share the air, and to see what the rest of the kite world has been working on! Whether you're flying, competing, or taking time to enjoy the events and sky art, you'll find plenty to enjoy because this week-long-kite festival features exhibits, activities, a buggy demonstation, international guests, and is August's hub of kite excitement on the West Coast.

The World Kite Museum and Hall of Fame will exhibit a display "Sports Kites: A Quiet Riot," allowing visitors to discover the developmental history of the multi-line kite, take a look at competitive opportunities, and hear about power options in sport kiting. And the World Kite Museum offers dual line workshops and demonstrations on the

beach daily during the festival.

Friday there will be a night fly featuring lighted kites and kites illuminat-

ed by spotlights. A fireworks show will begin at dusk.

Saluting the festival on Saturday, Joy Burtis and her Parachute Exhibition
Team will open the recognition Ceremonies by "dropping in" at 10:00 a.m.

WSIKF features international guests from Europe and from Australia this year. The Decorators, a group of four kite fliers known for their showy sport kite routines will provide some very exciting entertainment. Felix Mottram, (England), Jacob Twyford, (England) Romney Johnstone (Scotland) and Johnny Claffey (Ireland) started out as dual-line competitors, but have truly found their niche as showmen.

Please call me at (206) 863-8435 to let me know if you plan to attend. We also will have door prizes. We have a lot of excellent kitemakers in the WKA, so if you have something that you would like to donate please get in touch with me or Ken Conrad at (206)624-6886.

We could use some volunteers to help set up, serve, and clean up, like last year. The help and donations are greatly appreciated. From Australia, Tony Wolfenden will display his rokkaku and giant genkis forms that feature long tails and wings, emblazoned with his bold graphic design.

The Ilwaco Heritage Museum will feature a display commemorating the 100th Anniversary of the box Kite, covering the evolution of this hard-working kite.

Record-setting will be featured on Sunday, August 21st; the goal is to break the Western Hemisphere record for the most kites in the sky at one time. A count will be taken from just South of 10th Street to the Chautauqua Lodge, north of the Bolstad Approach. Exact times will be announced. Also, a \$1,000 prize will be awarded for each existing Guinness Book of World Records kite record broken during the '94 WSIKE. Preregistration of world record attempts is required.



Buggying at WSIKF

A BUGGY DEMO WILL TAKE PLACE Monday afternoon at WSIKF (depending on the weather). The buggy area will be roped off, so everyone will be sure to catch a glimpse of this exciting and active form of kiteflying!

Open buggying will be allowed in specific areas on the beach. Please check with officials for exact locations. If you bring your buggy, be sure to bring safety gear and use it!! Responsible and considerate buggying will go far to convince the city that allowing the buggy folks access to the beach is an idea whose time has come.

Just as an extra caution: remember the companies that rent horses to folks for beach riding may access these areas, so don't let your buggying activity spook the horses. The shadow or noise of the kite could spook a horse, so stop the buggy and allow horse and rider to pass safely.






