A Tribute to Harold Writer

I first saw him standing on the top of "Kite Hill", Gaswovrks Park, so designated by the Mayor of Seattle in the early 1980's, and it was in the early 80's that I saw Harold holding onto a kite string. He stood there dressed in his usual recognizable uniform of khaki colored clothes, a khaki colored hat sitting atop his head and binoculars hanging around his neck. One would think he stepped right out of a suspense novel. I always thought of Zane Grey when I saw him.

Harold Writer was so quiet, you hardly knew he was there until you looked up in the sky and would see this one extra ordinary kite flying so straight and high that you had to trace the line down to this striking figure standing on the windward side of the hill. Harold was so approachable, once you touched his eyes with yours and saw the gleam you knew this was no ordinary man.

The most exquisite kites flying out of the Northwest since the 1950's have been handmade by Harold. I have one of this butcher paper and wood Hargrave box kites still hanging in my shop. It is signed, numbered and dated 1962 by Harold. It was a gift from Harold when I bid \$25 for one of his miniature kite mobiles at the 1980 AKA Convention held in Seattle. He thought I had bid such an outrageously high sum for the mobile I should have one of the "real" kites. Actually, all the miniatures did fly.

So began a 20-year relationship with one of the true kite artists of the Northwest. Harold built all of his early kites from hand-cut spruce and butcher paper. Later he started sewing and making his box kites with fabric and wonderful spars with handmade spooned ends to fit in the pockets better. He built and flew kites because he enjoyed being outdoors and around people. He would drop by the shop and buy supplies for making his kites and always would drop a little pearl of wisdom.

How's the Wind at Magnuson Park?

Puget Sound kite fliers well know the challenges of finding good quality winds here. Many Seattle area fliers have discovered and experienced the excellent winds on Kite Hill at Magnuson Park in northeast Seattle (in the Sand Point area). Magnuson Park is located on a broad peninsula of land which extends into Lake Washington. So, when there is wind on the lake, it's likely there is also wind at Magnuson.

We have all experienced watching some promising wind while at work or at home, later packing the kites in the car, then driving to the favorite kite field to find no wind or very light winds. Wouldn't it be nice to know what the winds are like at the field, right now!? There are actually at least three ways to learn how the winds are at Magnuson Park. First, NOAA weather radio (162.55 MHz in the Seattle area) reports the Magnuson winds every ten to 15 minutes. It is reported as "north-east Seattle" or Sand Point, and is the last hour's average wind speed. Radio Shack and outdoor outfitters sell portable weather band battery powered radios for \$20 and up.

A second way to check for promising winds at Magnuson Park is to surf the internet to the Department of Transportation web page for weather conditions on the 520 bridge at <http://traffic.wsdot.wa.gov/520/bridge/520.htm>. This page shows the current wind speed in miles per hour, wind direction, and the maximum gust speed in the past hour.

The third and far more detailed means to access wind condition information is via the Internet, at http://www.atmos.washington.edu/cgi-bin/latest_uw.cgi?uw. This data is collected on the rooftop of the University of Washington Atmospheric Sciences building, located near the Lake Washington ship canal, several miles south of Magnuson Park. I have been using this site for the past four years to find the wind prospects at Kite Hill. In all instances, this data has been reliably predictive of the wind conditions at Magnuson.

While working on this article, I learned that Terry Templeman, the WKA Webmaster, has added links at the WKA website for these two online anemometers, the one at the 520 bridge and at the UW. Now these useful pages are reachable by just two clicks at <http://wkaonline.org>. Look for the weather heading and click on the anemometer headings. Thanks Terry!***

One time he brought me a photo from 1952 of his kites and his kids. I had no idea that anyone was making and flying kites back then. Silly me.

When local kite flyers gathered to say goodbye to Harold, we all learned even more about Harold that none of us were aware of. Harold was born in Middleberg, Florida in 1914. His pears moved to Naches, Washington where they owned an apple orchard but were burned out and live in a tent. So began Harold's love of the outdoors. His interests were many and included black smithing, welding and hand loaded guns. Camping, exploring, birds, trains, natural sciences, cooking and marrying his high school sweetheart Irene. We also learned that Harold had a TV show on Public Broadcasting teaching kites. The show was called Harold and His Kites.

The minister of the service used the most wonderful old fashion adjectives to describe Harold. He engaged in socializing, was highly organized, not religious but honorable, modest, generous and had a great sense of humor (that's the twinkle I was talking about). To Harold, life was not measured by duration but by donation (that's why he never sold his kites but donated them). His children said they would have wanted to know him even if he wasn't their father.

After the service, I stopped to meet with Harold's children and to share some of their wonderful experiences. I told his daughter that one time when I met Harold on the hill, he had his usual binoculars hanging around his neck. He leaned over and said, "You know most people think I use these to take a closer look at the kites and the birds. What they don't know is that I'm really taking a closer look at all the pretty girls." The gleam in his eye seemed to glow even brighter.**
