Our banquet was an Italian potluck where everyone brought one item for dinner. After everyone had finished eating and cleared away, we handed out the awards which didn't take very long since there was only one event. We had seven flyers for the event. There were awesome scores all around. The top three in order were Wayne Turner, Jeff Reid, and Scott Davis. Doug Hagaman Memorial Fly

Back in September 2003 David Robinson of the White Horse Kite Flyers in England called me to say the Martin Croxton had suggested they have a memorial fly for Doug Hagaman. Martin reminded club members it was going to be 10 years since Doug died.

For those who are unaware of Doug Hagaman: he was a master Parafoil maker who, over many years, perfected that form of kite.

"Great idea" I said agreeing with David. Then the subject of having a pin for everyone who flies their parafoil came up. "Great idea" I say again. So naturally I volunteered for the job. While working on the pin and not paying much attention to anything else, Sylvia Bernauer of the Washington Kitefliers Association read an article in the White Horse Kite Flyers newsletter about the Doug Hagaman Memorial Fly. She too thought having a memorial fly on the same day would be great. So with Sylvia's organization, Marla's phone calling and pins ready to go we waited anxiously for Dec. 14th.

The day arrived and as Doug would have it, the skies cleared of predicted rain, the temperature dropped, the sun peaked out and the wind blew. Boy, did it blow. The wind can be too strong for a parafoil and this was the day. Many of us went ahead and launched our kites but they did not stay up long. The wind speed was approximately 30 mph.

We had about 26 people, 16 or 17 Hagaman parafoils and a special treat of Doug's mother bringing her small parafoil to fly that Doug had made for her. Due to the wind chill factor we took the group photo, passed out the pins and shared some special stories about Doug. Sonny Hamner and Ken Tumminia drove up from Oregon on Saturday and back on Sunday just for this fly. Well, maybe Sonny did it for the pin too. I won't share photos and dialog about Sonny's wind tubes and trees. Just ask him next time you see him.

The White Horse Kite Flyers in England had light wind and very cold weather. They managed to fly 13 parafoils that day. Stretch Tucker in Florida waited all day for the rain to stop to fly his. No luck! The Lehigh Valley Kite Society in Pennsylvania braved very cold temperatures and snow to fly their club parafoil.

All in all it turned out to be a successful Memorial fly with Doug's mother bewildered that this many people after 10 years still thought of Doug. Then gradually those shops began selling air toys and etc. in their need to meet public demand for those toys and etc. besides buying just a kite.

There seems to be a gradual reduction in the over all numbers of "brick and mortar" shops in general. It is hard for these "brick and mortar" businesses to compete with those online kite businesses out there. These online kite shops usually offer some of their items at a discount as compared to brick and mortar shops. Many people will go to their local kite shop only to check out kites and accessories they are thinking about buying online because they might save a few bucks by buying these items online. Many want their local shops to match the prices of those online businesses, and get upset when that local shop owner says that they cant, or wont drop their prices to match some online shop prices.

I feel that kite flyers in general need to stop and think about things here. I feel that these kite flyers need o think about supporting their local shops and stores. Sure you might save a few bucks by buying that new kite or accessories from some online business, but what happens when you need help with that online purchase? You go to a local business to see if they can fix your online special for you. You go to the local business to get information and etc. that the online business cant or wont help you with. You go to that local business to have them fix things for you, or to help you understand something you bought online.

I feel that all of us need to get behind and fully support those local shops and businesses that sell, or make kites and accessories. Instead of going there to check out some kite or accessory that you plan on buying online because you might save a few bucks. I for one feel it is worth the added expense of buying from a local business to get the sales and service that you donut really get with some online businesses. I don't mind having to pay a little more to get something right now versus having to wait for my items to be shipped to me. I like being able to just drop in and get what I need or desire the same day. It is nice to stand and visit with these business owners or their employees about new kite items or ideas.

WSIKF Children's Day Event

As enthusiastic kites, we know that we must attract new and younger people to our sport. For this to happen, children need to acquire a love of kite flying as early in life as possible.

Wednesdays at WSIKF have long been designated as "Kids Day" with special field events for children in the morning and kite making in the afternoon. These are wonderful events, and encourage many children to enthusiastically participate.

However, the majority of us are not directly involved with these events and, all too often, we forget to include the preferences and needs of children in planning our kite displays for the day. So, last year WKA came up with an idea to involve more members of the kiting community in making this day even more special for children. Those events will be continued and expanded upon this year. Please join WKA in its efforts to make the sport of kiting more accessible to our youngest spectators.

Judging in all of the events will be based on showing kites, ground displays, and anything else that will particularly appeal to the "under 14" crowd. Please include things like: kids' songs; books; cartoons and comics; nursery rhymes; movies; and TV characters. Judges will have wide discretion in awarding points and can probably be bribed or otherwise influenced.

There will be ribbons awarded to the winners of each event. There will also be special recognition of these winners at the WKA Spaghetti Feed on Wednesday night. Think of this as an opportunity to "double dip." The events are as follows:

1. **Best Kids' Camp:** The first event is the one that will take the most advanced planning. Join with your friends or work alone to and set up a display that will appeal specifically to kids. A few of the multitude of possible themes: Nemo; Pirates; Harry Potter.

Also, as you know, kids like things they can touch and see up close. They also like to learn about the history of kites; how to make them; and the names of the different kites. You will earn extra points if you have educational displays and/or actual kite making activities taking place at your camp. If you get started now, you can make displays for your local library for Kite Month, reuse the display at the Puyallup Spring Fair; and then reuse the same displays at WSIKF! Let's get those kids hooked on something good while they are young and impressionable!

2. **Best Group of Kids' Kites:** Not enough time, energy, or stuff to set up a whole camp? Then just come up with a display of at least six items that especially appeal to kids.

3. **Foster Grandparent Fun Fly:** This is new this year. A special time has been set aside to fly kites that are particularly appealing to kids. This event is similar to a "Mass Ascension" with a few extra twists. Prior registration will be required and all flying will be done in pairs, as follows:

First, no "adult" kites will be allowed on the field unless they are accompanied by a child under the age of 14. And, all kids under 14 who want to fly must be sponsored by a "foster grandparent." You are welcome to provide your own grandchild. However, children will sign up ahead of time to volunteer to be temporarily adopted as "grandchildren" for this event. (Just in case you do not have a grandchild of your own available.)

Second, the "adult" will be required to provide a kite for their "foster grandchild" to fly and keep. This can be a hand-crafted or commercial kite. Smaller kites are probably best. There will be a few extra kites available for those who come unprepared or you can purchase something at the World Kite Museum tent on the beach.

Third, the "adults" will teach their "grandchild" how to safely and successfully fly the gift kite. Since most of the "adult" fliers will be experienced kites, this will give the "grandchildren" actual one-on-one, hands-on tutoring. We anticipate that many of the children will probably be from "spectator" families; may have never flown a kite before; and may have no one in their family experienced and patient enough to provide proper teaching of this skill.

Other prizes and/or ribbons may be awarded at the Judges' discretion. Make a good case for why your Kids' Day display should win something!

Just mail a card or note to our club address, printed on this newsletter, and if you are a current member at the time of the drawing in August, your special "ticket" could be pulled from the bag and you could be the recipient of next year's scholarship. WKM Workshops

Double Delta Conyne Workshop *February 14-16, 2004*

John Freeman and Lynn Lary will be building a kite with about a 12 foot span on President's Day Weekend. For those who don't know what a DDC is, it is like two triangular box kites, side by side with a panel between, with a delta wing on each side. One of the most reliable flyers in anyone's kite bag. Easy to assemble-only one stick to put in or take out. We will make a big log cabin quilting square, and split it diagonally for the wings. The center panel will have graphics in colors to match. With, of course, the usual arrangement of almost limitless colors to choose from. Cost is \$80 to cover materials.

A Springtime Creation *March 6-7, 2004*

Lee Taylor brings fabric painting instruction to this kite design and making workshop. Each participant will learn resist and fabric painting techniques while decorating a 28" by 28" kite skin with 3 sets of dramatic ripstop tails. Lee says this can easily be done in the two days, plus time to fly a bit. All materials will be provided. Besides the sewing machines, thread, etc., each person needs to prepare the kite tails before they come, if possible. Three colors of rip stop are recommended. Make one 15' and two 10' tails of each of the three colors, all 3" before hemming. Choose the colors you'd like to use in your kite.

Cost: \$50. Location is tentatively scheduled for the Long Beach Elementary School.

"Tangler", a Fighter Kite Workshop *April, 2004*

Bruce and Donna Lambert are hosting a fighter kite workshop for the Museum beginning at 10 am in the Long Beach Elementary School Gymnasium. This kite, designed by Bruce, is a high performance North American style fighter kite that helped him win the 2003 Line Touch World Cup Competition.

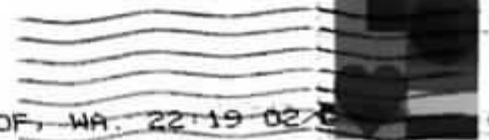
